**Introduction**

Welcoming new families and returning students and promptly securing school and guidance appointments are the primary functions of the Registration Office. Since the Registration Office is frequently the first point of contact that families have with the Shaker Heights City School District, every effort is made to provide helpful enrollment and procedural information to parents. Prior to students attending school, all families must provide proof of their residence. The commitment of the Registrar is to identify and enroll only those students who are legally entitled to attend the Shaker schools as well as to enforce the residency and custody laws of the State of Ohio.

As of May 2011 registration for students entering the Shaker Heights schools is by appointment. Students entering grades 5–12 are asked to complete a short assessment. Initial reports about the assessment process are positive. They have been very helpful to the middle school and high school counselors as they create schedules for new students and help them with their transitions to a new school setting. It is our goal to make the introduction to the Shaker Heights City School District a pleasant and positive experience. Continuing to make the registration process a positive experience is always our goal, as a result, we are using common registration forms with other First Ring School Districts to expedite the registration process even more. We want families to feel good as they leave registration and embark upon their journeys as Shaker families.

**Registration**

Some of the ongoing services provided by the Registration Office include:

- Enrollment of Pre-K children with disabilities
- Kindergarten outreach and registration
- Student enrollment, withdrawal and guardianship verification
- Updating of registration information to District website
- Issuance of I-20 forms for international student enrollment
- Voter registration
- Residency and custody investigations
- Verification of community/charter school student enrollment

The Registration Office typically enrolls more than 700 children in a school year. Approximately half are new kindergarten students; the rest are re-entries and students who are new to the District and to the Shaker Heights area.

During their visit to the Registration Office, parents are encouraged to tour their child's new school, are briefed on the school day, school calendar, PTO information, after-school activities, and tutoring programs. After completing registration, they are given the *Essential Information for Parents* packet.

The first Shaker Heights school opened in 1912. From that moment to the present, the Shaker Heights community has not wavered from its commitment to provide exceptional educational experiences for its youth. The District has earned a national reputation for educational excellence based upon its challenging academic and co-curricular programs, outstanding faculty and support staff, and innovative curriculum development. The District includes eight

school buildings, educates approximately 5,400 students annually, employs more than 800 people, and takes pride in the success of its more than 34,000 graduates.

The School District is particularly proud of its diverse student body. Families from virtually every economic, racial and religious background seek homes within the Shaker Heights City School District's boundaries. Increasingly, international families are attracted to the District. Currently, students are enrolled from Australia, China, Egypt, England, Puerto Rico, Taiwan, India, Ethiopia, Germany and France, just to name a few. The pursuit of excellence in education is the common motivation that attracts them to this first-ring suburb of Cleveland, Ohio.

The High School offers 22 AP courses in 18 subject areas and more than 200 courses in 12 departments that include academic preparation for college, the fine and performing arts, and vocational education.

The International Baccalaureate Organization has officially designated Shaker Heights High School as an IB World School. Key attributes of the program are being introduced into all K-4 schools as well as middle grades. This program allows Shaker to remain competitive by offering a world-class education.

The Shaker schools experience unique benefits and challenges due to its multicultural school population. District staff constantly strives to meet the changing needs of its heterogeneous student body.

### **Residency**

The Registrar regularly attends meetings with attorneys, judges, fellow registrars, and investigators in order to keep abreast of changing laws regarding student attendance, enrollment and custody. As a matter of practice, students who are improperly enrolled by their parents in the Shaker Heights City School District are immediately withdrawn and their parents are billed for tuition, as established annually by the State of Ohio Board of Education. The Registrar and District Treasurer, along with the local courts, pursue prosecution and tuition collection and at times criminal prosecution when illegal enrollment is determined.

At the close of the 2010-11 school year, the Registration Office conducted 265 investigations of residency - of that number, 58 students were withdrawn due to residency. Other investigations involved returned mail because of incorrect envelope labels, unreported family moves within the District, or different child care arrangements, lifestyle, or personal situations which result in actions that raise questions about residency.

Illegal student enrollment is a constant concern. To reduce the number of improper enrollments within the District, the following procedures are in place:

- Periodic communication with landlords of apartment buildings and rental homes;
- Use of the *Certificate of Occupancy*, issued by the City of Shaker Heights, for any rental property as required proof of residency;
- Investigation of all anonymous tips and investigation requests from staff and community members;
- Analysis of returned mail and disconnected phone lines;
- Use of the Cuyahoga County Auditor's website to verify home ownership and to locate landlords;
- Consultation with local police and fire officials, as well as legal counsel, when appropriate; and,
- Collaboration with City officials and First-Ring school district officials to address related issues of residency and occupancy standards.

## **Racial Composition of the Student Body**

Like all public school districts in Ohio, the Shaker Heights City School District is required to provide statistical information on the racial composition of its student population. Statistical information for the current school year with comparative data from the last decade is presented in the exhibits following this report.

It is important to note some limitations of the data included here. In all the data presented, the reader must be careful not to assume that the numbers are precise. Each student's race is reported by the parent(s) or legal guardian(s) and sometimes reflects the child's appearance and culture more than race. International families are often unaccustomed to defining their race and sometimes use a standard different from the typical American definition of race. Moreover, the statistics change constantly as families move in and out of the District.

When the District reports data to the state and federal governments, the following newly revised designations are used; of the six listed below, parents may choose one or more of the following categories: American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, Black or African American, Pacific Islander or Native Hawaiian, Hispanic/Latino, White, Multiracial/other.

Because the racial composition of the School District is of great interest to many people, individuals tend to compare and contrast statistics taken at various points in time. The racial composition of a small school can vary significantly when one family moves in or out of the community; therefore, it is important to view the following statistics as expressing the student composition within a general range rather than a specific figure.

It should also be noted that these statistics include special education students and Pre-Kindergarten classes at Onaway Elementary School, which serves preschool children with disabilities from throughout the District. Students with disabilities who reside within the District but are educated outside the District are not included in these figures.

**NOTE:** All racial data contained in this report are based on a student enrollment count as of October 2011, by the District's Data Processing Department.

**Exhibit #1** shows the percentage of students enrolled in the individual Shaker schools by race, as well as district-wide statistics.

**Exhibit #2** shows the total enrollment and the enrollment by race on a grade-by-grade basis.
